

From Year 9 Agriculture Students










Nanga Mai Awards

The SALSA program stands for Students As LifeStyle Activists and is a peer lead program that engages students to make their *own* healthier lifestyle choices.

April 16-24 marked NSW Youth Week—an opportunity for young people to express their ideas and views, act on issues that affect their lives, and create and enjoy activities and events.

PAINTED handball and volleyball courts, water refilling stations and sporting grounds with artificial turf are all ideas students from select western Sydney high schools recently brought to the table.

These recreational improvements are part of an action plan coordinated by the Western Sydney Local Health District (WSLHD) Students As LifeStyle Activists (SALSA) program and schools across western Sydney.

Overcoming the ongoing challenges of COVID-19 and flooding events, student leaders from SALSA Youth Voices recently gathered together at Rooty Hill High School to deliver their School Action Plans.

Associate Professor Smita Shah said leadership in schools works because students listen to their peers.

"The schools will have these sporting improvements in action by the end of this year and early next year," A/Prof Shah said.

ydney Dance Company's: Impermanence. Originally due to have its premiere in March 2020 before the start of the COVID-19 pandemic and Sydney's first lockdown, Sydney Dance Company's new work Impermanence has finally hit the stage at the Company's home — Roslyn Packer Theatre, Walsh Bay. Choreographed by Rafael Bonachela, accompanied by The Australian String Quartet playing music composed Bryce Dessner and performed by the Sydney Dance Company's 17 dancers, Impermanence was inspired by the devastating bushfires that struck Australia in 2019-2020, The Notre Dame Cathedral fire in Paris during the same year and the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic.

After the show was cancelled and the country was in lockdown, the dancers from the Sydney Dance Company began learning the movements for the performance via Zoom. When lockdown ended and they were able to resume rehearsals, Impermanence was reworked from its original 40 minute piece into an hour long, full length performance. With a mixture of modern contemporary dance, ballet technique and yoga movements the

dancers are focused on each other throughout and commit to telling the story in a breathtakingly believable way.

Impermanence was the first live performance I have seen since the world went into lockdown. My first impression of the show was that it was really dark, and you could barely see the dancers, which created an eerie feeling of not knowing what was coming. When the lights dimmed, and the music started I was immediately transported into a world I knew, a world that I had just lived in the past 12 months — I was mesmerized from the first movement.

The Company's dancers come from all over the world, from places such as Spain, Italy and New Zealand. Lead performer Juliette Barton has been with the Sydney Dance Company for almost 12 years, she is one of the longest serving dancers at the Company. Juliette and Davide Di Giovanni were breathtaking in their duet, and Juliette also performs a mesmerising solo where her body seems to fall in slow motion. Dancers from the Company have come from prominent studios across Australia, such as Eve and Bow and Brent Street and of course from around the world.

Rafael Bonachela is a contemporary based choreographer who was born in Barcelona Spain, and now lives in Sydney, he is currently the Artistic Director of the Sydney Dance Company. Whilst his passion is based in contemporary dance, he has also choreographed for pop stars like Kylie Minogue and Tina Turner. Looking at his previous works "Frame of Mind" and "360°" you can see similarities in his works – he likes to use large open backdrops that evolve with the dance such as curtains and mirrors, he also likes to keep the dancers costumes simple with a minimalist aspect opting for nude or earthy colour schemes to contrast the open set and clothes that are fit tight to their bodies to further enhance the dancer's movements throughout and to keep the audiences focus on the performance.

Having previously worked with Grammy Award-winning American contemporary composer Bryce Dessner, better known for his work on movie scores and his American rock band "The National", Bonachela and Dessner have reunited to create Impermanence. While "Frame of Mind" saw Dessner create the music to fit Bonachela's choreography, Impermanence has seen Dessner and Bonachela collaborate to create the music and choreography simultaneously, making it a shared piece. Also common to both pieces is the presence of The Australian String Quartet positioned at the back right of the stage for the entire performance while dancers perform around them — engaging the audience's senses with beats

matching the dancer's movements and flashes of lights that coincide with the dancer's accents, a true feast for the senses.

The set designed by David Fleischer, is a simple open and abstract design that is so effective with its constantly changing colour scheme (which changes from white to pink to orange and opens up to a dark blue light with falling pieces of plastic to represent snow and ashes) to match the movement and story being told, while highlighting the significant events being portrayed in the piece.

I would like to thank Rafael Bonachela, Bryce Dessner, The Australian String Quartet and The Sydney Dance Company for letting me experience the incredible performance of Impermanence, they showed great detail throughout the performance and really made the audience think back to how much life has changed during the past 12 months. After a 12 month break due to COVID-19 The Sydney Dance Company is back and live on stage.



Hope Installation





Pete Turner stated "A photographers work is given shape and style by








Harmony Day Poster Competition



In these first few weeks, in addition to our normal timetabled lessons and ensembles and the usual daily school routines, we've also had Year 7 Camp, Year 11 Life Ready Camp, NAPLAN tests for Years 7 and 9, Mother's Day stall run by our CAPAbility Crew in the Support Unit, the school and Zone Cross Country carnivals, school and community Anzac ceremonies, completion of the student Tell Them From Me surveys, Athletics carnival (planned, but postponed due to wet weather), Year 7

vaccinations, Year 10 Wellbeing workshops by Headspace, and many other excursions, incursions and events.

This term we have also welcomed the arrival of our newest addition, bringing the pitter-patter of little hooves to our school farm. We have adopted a baby girl in the form of our gorgeous little calf, Mooana. She is an adventurous, cheeky and affectionate little girl who has already made an impact and made her presence felt. We are looking forward to watching her grow and hopefully win prizes in some shows.

Our Positive Behaviour for Learning program continues to roll out a Weekly Focus that promotes our core values of Care, Opportunity and Success. So far this term some of our themes have been:

- Be at class on time
- Wear your uniform with pride
- Speak kindly and politely
- Keep our school clean

We have introduced a Move to Class Song, which is selected each week to reflect the message of the weekly focus. The Move to Class song plays for 3 minutes at the end playground time before school, at recess, and at lunch time. By the time the song finishes, and the bell goes, students should be at their classroom ready to learn. Fast and Frequent reward tickets have also been introduced this term to reinforce the weekly focus behaviours. Teachers can give these tickets to any student who demonstrates the positive behaviour. Students place these tickets into

boxes provided and a draw is held at assembly each week to win canteen voucher prizes.

Changes to the way students are able to access the toilets during class time have been introduced this term. Our priority for student wellbeing and safety, the right of all students to access hygienic and well maintained facilities and our commitment to maximise learning time in class are at the centre of these initiatives. The new system of accessing the toilets in the front office building when lessons are in progress is providing a safe, clean and manageable option for students. The self sign-in and sign-out processes using the computer system that has been set up in the student office makes it easy for students and teachers to account for student time out of class. We are monitoring this data closely and we are open to feedback if there are any issues we can address to improve our procedures.

Term 2 is also a very busy term for assessment and most students will be managing a number of tasks for different courses that will need to be completed over the next few weeks. Students and teachers work together to address the outcomes of their subjects and students are able to show their understanding of this in the work they submit. Students are encouraged to seek support from their teachers before their tasks are due so they can maximise their achievement. Homework Centre runs every Monday and Thursday after school and is an excellent resource for seeking that little bit of extra help if it is needed. We look forward to meeting with parents at our scheduled Parent-Teacher nights and encourage our parents to be partners in learning with us.

We welcomed a new calf early in the term named Mooana, and she has already proven to be a popular addition to our farming activities. In addition to this our postponed Cross Country event was a great success, as have been our Year 7 and Year 11 Camps. NAPLAN has also occurred this week and our students in both Years 7 and 9 maintained excellent standards of effort and behaviour

throughout these assessments.

I was fortunate enough to spend some time at both the Year 7 and Year 11 camps in recent weeks. I was particularly impressed with the way in which our students challenged themselves and encouraged each other to go beyond their usual comfort zone with the various activities. The team work on display, as well as the positive friendships forged and reinforced, was acknowledged by camp staff as particularly exceptional. Well done to our students for once again demonstrating how fantastic our school community is, and for your excellent representation of our school. Below is an excerpt from Orson L in Year 7 who has reflected on his camp highlights:

"The Great Aussie Bushcamp was very fun. My favourite part was the activities. My friends and I had lots of fun going on the giant swing, the tree tops, and many more. My favourite part of the tree tops was where you could jump and land right on the wall and slide down. I had lots of fun at the Great Aussie Bushcamp."

We are now moving into a section of the term where assessment tasks and half yearly exams will occur across most year groups across each subject. I ask parents to encourage students to remain focused on preparing thoroughly for their assessments, whilst also acknowledging that assessment tasks are an important part of the ongoing learning process. Assessment tasks are so often viewed as an end-point in the learning cycle,

but at Nepean we view assessment tasks as important sign-posts to check learning progress and make adjustment to our teaching and learning. The homework centre will remain well-staffed over the coming weeks to ensure students are able to access additional assistance with their learning and assessment task preparation.

Our P&C property day yesterday was a great community event, with plenty of hands on deck to assist with some general tasks around the school. I greatly appreciate the strong partnership we have with our P&C and would encourage parents to remain as actively involved in the P&C as your time and schedules can allow.

Our Senior Parent/Teacher evening is upon us for students in Years 10, 11 and 12; Year 11 reports will be distributed to students in readiness for this event. We look forward to the opportunity to speak with parents about students' learning progress in more depth than the written report can allow. For any parents unable to attend this evening to discuss learning progress for students in Years 10, 11 and 12 please feel free to contact teachers directly if you would like to discuss progress in a specific subject, or contact the Year Advisor for general information about progress.

Staff have continued to monitor issues relating to vapes and aerosol deodorant cans within our school community. I ask once again for parent support around ensuring that students DO NOT bring these items to school at any time. Furthermore, I remind all parents that vehicle entry to the staff carpark is restricted to staff, deliveries, and specialised transport only. The carpark space has become dangerous to pedestrians with an increasing number of parents driving their students into the carpark to drop them off. This is a serious Health and Safety issue, and I request your support in ensuring our student transit area between our buildings on either side of the carpark is prioritised.

What every parent and carer needs to know about the Gallop inquiry

The first inquiry into the work of NSW public school teachers since 2004 has just handed down its final report. The Inquiry, headed by former WA Premier Dr Geoff Gallop, has recommended major changes to the salaries and working conditions of teachers.

The report states the changes were urgently needed to help address teacher shortages, improve teaching and ensure we can recruit enough teachers to cater for rapidly increasing enrolments in public schools.

Four key findings

- 1. The inquiry found the dedication and commitment of teachers remains high but workloads have become unsustainable. All aspects of the work of teachers have been altered due to constant policy changes, advances in technology, curriculum changes and the increasingly complex needs of students. Teachers now have heavy administration workloads outside the classroom as well, including data collection and reporting and compliance work. On average, teachers work 55 hours a week.
- 2. Salaries of teachers have fallen compared with other professions. While the work of teachers has become harder and more complex, their salaries are now significantly below the average of all professions. This dangerous combination is leading to recruitment and retention issues and making it more difficult to attract the high achievers we need for the future.
- **3. Student numbers in NSW are set to increase and teacher shortages must be addressed.** The inquiry found teacher shortages are an issue across NSW and said this had to be addressed ahead of a record increase in enrolments 200,000 extra students expected over the next 20 years.
- **4.Teachers need more time for collaborative work, planning and preparation.** The time teachers have each week outside the classroom has not increased since the 1950s for secondary teachers and the 1980s for primary teachers. The inquiry found teachers need more dedicated time to prepare and collaborate with their colleagues, particularly given the increase in the number of students with higher needs.

Recommendations for change

Increase the preparation time teachers have. The number of hours outside the classroom should increase from two to four per week in primary schools and there should be a reduction of two hours in the face-to-face teaching hours of secondary teachers. This time should be dedicated to assessment, lesson planning and collaboration.

Reset salaries. An increase of between 10 and 15 per cent in 2022 and 2023 to recognise the increase in teachers' skills and responsibilities, help overcome shortages and recruit the additional teachers needed to cope with enrolment growth.

Lift the number of school counsellors. An urgent increase in counsellor numbers to reduce waiting times and address rising student mental health issues. There should be one counsellor for every 500 students by 2023.

Improve staffing levels. Permanent teacher numbers should be increased to overcome the shortages of casuals. The excessive use of temporary teacher employment should be addressed. Support services, previously provided by the Department of Education in areas such as curriculum implementation, student welfare and behaviour and special education, should be restored.

Investing in teachers. Acting on the recommendations of the Inquiry will help improve teaching and learning in NSW public schools. It will also make teaching more attractive so we can keep our best teachers in the classroom and recruit the additional ones required to meet rapidly increasing enrolments.

These changes are an investment in our future that will pay off for our kids and our country

Behaviour code for students

NSW public schools

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive and responsive learning environments for everyone. We teach and model the behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected to:

- Respect other students, their teachers and school staff and community members
- Follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- Strive for the highest standards in learning
- Respect all members of the school community and show courtesy to all students, teachers and community members
- Resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- Comply with the school's uniform policy or dress code
- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Respect all property
- Not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco into our schools
- Not bully, harass, intimidate or discriminate against anyone in our schools

Schools take strong action in response to behaviour that is detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high quality teaching and learning.

Behaviour Code for Students: Actions

Promoting the learning, wellbeing and safety of all students in NSW Public Schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity
- Speak and behave courteously
- Cooperate with others
- Develop positive and respectful relationships and think about the effect on relationships before acting
- · Value the interests, ability and culture of others
- Dress appropriately by complying with the school uniform or dress code
- Take care with property

Safety

- Model and follow departmental, school and/or class codes of behaviour and conduct
- Negotiate and resolve conflict with empathy
- Take personal responsibility for behaviour and actions
- Care for self and others
- Avoid dangerous behaviour and encourage others to avoid dangerous behaviour

Engagement

- Attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- Arrive at school and class on time
- Be prepared for every lesson
- Actively participate in learning
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning

The principal and school staff, using their professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments. The department provides a policy framework and resources such as Legal Issues Bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context the NSW Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.
