


The colony's next destination will be the University of Western Sydney to celebrate World Environment Day on 5 June 2021 and our students are busy producing Hope Butterflies.


they will be using the pottery wheel.

Nicholas' success in launching his brand, Lexie, at this event was evocative, memorable and inspirational. He aspired the heights and achieved this attainment.



his year we have submitted 3 artworks into the Young Archie Competition at the NSW Art Gallery. The Young Archie Competition invites budding artists between the ages of 5 and 18 to submit a portrait. There are four age categories: 5-8 year olds, 9-12 year olds, 13-15 year olds and 16-18 year olds.

Beginning in 2013, this annual competition is judged by the Gallery's family programs manager and a guest judge, based on merit and originality. As well as online, all finalists are displayed at the Art Gallery of NSW held in conjunction with the Archibald, Wynne and Sulman Prizes exhibition. Artworks receiving an honourable mention are also displayed online and, since 2014, at Sydney's SH Ervin Gallery.

The theme is a portrait of a person who is special to the entrant, who is known to the entrant and who plays a significant role in their life. Entries to the 2021 competition will be judged by a guest judge (artist Ramesh Mario Nithiyendran) and Victoria Collings, Art Gallery of NSW family programs manager, according to the following criteria: the relevance of the submitted artwork to the theme, as decided by the judges; artistic interpretation of the

theme, as decided by the judges; originality of the submission. We are hoping that these students will be some of the finalists in this competition.

he recent bad weather has had a significant impact upon our school community. Our students travel from all over greater Western Sydney, the Blue Mountains and the Hawksbury and it is at times like this that we fully appreciate the sacrifices that parents, carers and young people make to attend our school. Our thoughts are with all of our families who are experiencing hardship and dislocation as a consequence of the flooding. We hope that this difficult time ends quickly and stand ready to support our young people and their families as the recovery begins. It has been heartening to hear of students who, even as the

flood waters have risen around their homes and their community, have made contact with their teachers to discuss assessment tasks, deliver draft work and join online classes. It is a privilege to work with such young people who fulfil their responsibilities with great resilience and determination.

We held our Open Night on the evening of Tuesday 16 March. Even with the onset of poor weather and the COVID requirement the evening was well attended with over 350 people coming along to explore our school and examine what we have to offer. We are proud of our school and what it has to offer and greatly appreciate the opportunity to share this with prospective students and their families.

ur thoughts are with all students, families and staff who were affected by the recent floods in our community. Parents are encouraged to contact the school if there is anything we can do to support you.

The Strategic Improvement Plan for the next 4 years has now been finalised, and I wish to thank the P&C for their contribution to our consultation around our new vision statement. Staff and students have also helped to shape and refine our new vision statement. Please Our School Vision Statement on page 26. The Strategic Improvement Plan 2021-2024 will be published on the

school website in the coming days.

I would like to acknowledge Mr Matthew Knowles, who has been recognised this week at the NSW Nanga Mai Awards for his outstanding contribution to educational achievement for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students by a non-Aboriginal staff member in NSW Public Education. Congratulations Mr Knowles for all that you do in our community to acknowledge and pay respects to our First Nations people. Congratulations also to Monique T-O, our School Captain, who co-hosted the Nanga Mai Awards Ceremony this year.

I have been most impressed with our student leaders this term, both our School Captains team and our SRC. These students have worked tirelessly to make a very visible contribution to the life of our school. Their efforts in constantly modelling our core values, as well as the charitable work they have undertaken, is a clear demonstration of why Nepean is such a fabulous school. As we go to print, our students have raised over \$9000 for Kids with Cancer in a week where our school captains have also launched the 'Bridging the Gap' initiative to unite student leadership voice across our local community around issues that matter to our youth.

With a term's worth of learning almost behind us, I have asked our students to reflect upon their learning this term and challenged students to consider whether they have gained a term's worth of learning growth from a term's worth of engagement in their learning. In communicating with parents about student learning growth we will publish Year 12 half yearly reports this week, as well as trialling an interim update for students in Years 7, 8 and 11. The interim report will be similar in format to the reports issued in Semester 1

of last year, and will be published electronically via the Sentral parent portal.

Congratulations to Mr Cox, who will take up an appointment as the new Head Teacher, Teaching and Learning at Colo High School. We are very thankful for Mr Cox's contribution to student learning at Nepean over the last 5 years and wish him well on the next stage of his career in educational leadership.

From next term we have had to make some adjustments to our timetable for the remainder of the year. On Thursday students will be issued with a new timetable to commence at the beginning of the new term. We will start next term on Tuesday 20 April, starting on a week A of the new timetable. It will also go live on Sentral at the end of the week. Further communication will also be sent directly to students most affected by the changes, but the most significant whole school change is that from next term our year 8 students will commence roll call at 8:45am on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays in line with our students in Years 9-11. Year 7 and the SRC will continue to engage in the extended roll call program which starts at 8:35am on each of those days. Wednesdays will continue to commence at 8:35am for all students.

On some matters of concern, prohibited items including vapes and aerosol deodorant cans have become quite problematic within our school community. I ask for parent support around ensuring that students DO NOT bring these items to school at any time. Furthermore, I remind all parents that vehicle entry to the staff carpark is restricted to staff and specialised transport only. The carpark space has become increasingly dangerous to pedestrians this term with an increasing number of parents driving their students into the carpark to drop them off. This is a serious Health and Safety issue, and I request your support in ensuring our student transit area between our buildings on either side of the carpark is prioritised.

Finally, students are reminded that mobile phones are to be off and out of site during learning time. I ask parents to refrain from contacting your children during learning time on their mobile phones. Please direct any urgent messages through the front office.

Wishing everyone a restful 2 school holidays, and thank you for your ongoing support of our school.
